EXPLAINING THE PROCESS

Every year, AFP-WV releases an updated version of our Pathway to Prosperity Legislative Agenda. The Pathway to Prosperity is a comprehensive policy agenda that is meant to act as a roadmap for policymakers. It embodies the proven policy solutions that will change the state's status quo and help our fellow Mountaineers reach their full potential. Launched in 2019, the policy agenda seeks to elevate and amplify the voices of West Virginians across the state who want to remove the barriers that are holding them back. We believe these issues put us on a path toward reigniting the American Dream in the Mountain State.

We work with legislative leaders of both parties to enact the much-needed reforms we outline in the Pathway to Prosperity. When one of these policies is up for a vote in committee or on the floor, we send a Key Vote Alert to every member of the legislature indicating our support for the bill being decided upon. In some instances, we ask lawmakers to vote against legislation that will be detrimental to creating the conditions for a new and stronger West Virginia in which everyone can reach their full potential.

At the same time, we advocate for policies during the session through the use of our Key Vote Alerts and by connecting citizens with their lawmakers on the issues at hand. We monitor how lawmakers vote, and we use our annual scorecard to let folks know how their elected officials voted on some of the most critical issues from each legislative session. This helps to increase government transparency, get citizens engaged in the legislative process, and to inform lawmakers on the issues.

HB 2013 | CIVIL SERVICE PHASEOUT

West Virginia's civil service system has devolved into convoluted and inflexible system of red tape that prevents state government from hiring top-tier talent and rewarding high-performing employees while making it too costly and time-consuming to dismiss under-performing employees. HB 2013 phases out this system, increasing government efficiency and accountability while saving taxpayer dollars and allowing much needed flexibility to hire the best and brightest to serve the public better.

SB 570 | REINS ACT

SB 570 would have helped to create a clearer picture of the potential impact that certain regulations may have on the economy, including competitiveness with surrounding states, job creation, investment, and overall economic growth. It would have ensured legislative leaders had as much information as possible from agencies before approving proposed rules, as well as helping agencies to more deeply consider the economic consequences of rules they promulgate.

SB 458 | UNIVERSAL PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL LICENSURE ACT OF 2025

SB 458 will improve workforce mobility and reduce unnecessary barriers to employment by recognizing out-of-state licenses without requiring additional and unneeded red tape. The bill ensures professionals coming to West Virginia to provide their valuable services are granted licenses in our state through qualifying credentials they have acquired elsewhere, increasing job growth and service availability across our state in vital industries by removing harmful barriers that held our state back.

HB 2014 | POWER GENERATION AND CONSUMPTION ACT

The Power Generation and Consumption Act, creates a certified microgrid program in West Virginia to expand microgrid development, utilize coal and natural gas resources, and reinvest in West Virginia by creating funds to lower the income tax, provide funding for economic development, and stabilize the electric grid. HB 2014 cuts needless red tape to foster the growth of next generation industrial facilities by removing previous mandates for renewable energy sources.

SB 505 | ENSURING RELIABLE AND AFFORDABLE ELECTRICITY ACT

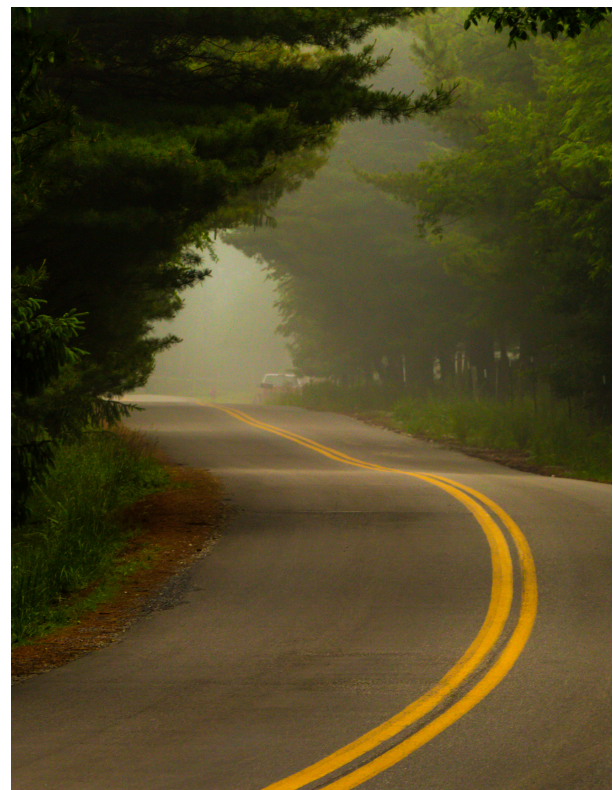

This legislation would have protected electric utility ratepayers from paying for electric generation and transmission that does not meet reliability standards while incentivizing the use of reliable power generation methods to shore up grid stability. The bill would have taken bold steps to protect ratepayers from being billed for assets that do not reliably generate electricity ensuring that, when it comes to ratepayers' electricity bills, you only pay for what you get.

Certificate of Need laws make it legal for hospitals CEOs to collude with unelected bureaucrats to veto new or expanded medical services in your community, keeping competition out at the expense of more quality health care options for West Virginia families. That's why both President Trump and Governor Morrissey have called for these harmful laws to be repealed. Sadly, the House Health Committee voted down HB 2007, legislation that repealed West Virginia's CON laws.

SB 810 | EXPANDING SCOPE OF PRACTICE FOR CERTIFIED REGISTERED NURSE ANESTHETISTS

BILL DESCRIPTIONS: EDUCATIONAL FREEDOM

Bill Descriptions: HB 2026, HB 3356, and HB 3357 represent the continued expansion of the Hope Scholarship program. This groundbreaking program was the first universal education freedom program in the nation, spurring over a dozen states to adopt similar policies. It allows parents to have a portion of their tax dollars back to find the right education for their children's unique needs.
